Program Notes

Known for his works for choir as well as wind ensemble, Árpád Balázs (b.1937) composed **Four Pictures** combining both singing and playing. The opening movement of the work is a stridently jolly, energetic "Induló" (March), while the expansive second movement is entitled "Cantilena." The third movement is the lively, but still lyrical "Arietta", and the work concludes with "Játék" (Play) which features a mixture of lines moving in parallel and then colliding with each other.

Composed in a traditional Hungarian dance style, **Bottle Dance** was originally written for the Blue Danube Harmonica Band in the early 1960s. Later, at the instigation of the excellent folk dance choreographer Miklos Manninger, an arrangement for wind band was prepared, in order to widen the ensemble's repertoire of German national pieces by the addition of a Hungarian dance. The production scored a resounding success not only with the audience but also with the musicians who performed in it, with the result that before long the composer prepared from the Bottle Dance an independent work for wind ensemble.

Donald Philips was a British composer, and through his long career he was regarded as a true "Tin Pan Alley" composer. Among his compositions were Old Piano Rag, A Live Show is the Best Show, Broken Date, and To Him We're All The Same. Two major mini-concertos stand out: Concerto in Jazz – recorded by several leading orchestras including Sidney Torch, Mantovani and George Melachrino; and Skyscraper Fantasy, which was probably his best-known work, although its transatlantic style sounded more like the work of an American composer, than a Londoner. His exotic duet for trumpets Trumpet Fiesta was skilfully arranged for symphonic band by Edrich Siebert.

With its energetic impetus and imposing instrumentation, *Concertino* is certainly outstanding in the oeuvre of Árpád Balázs. Among his compositions for concert band, it is by far the most engaging and exacting work. Composed in memory of his beloved father, the composition presents a contrast between death and a strong will to live. Its structure brings Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsodies to mind: its solemn opening, which returns at the end, is followed by a slow and a fast movement. The funereal music of the slow movement evolves from a motif of Bach's St. Matthew Passion with enormous intensification equal to the lament in Grieg's Peer Gynt. It is difficult to imagine a dramatic incandescence with a higher degree of heat. The heartbeat-imitating timpani features significantly at the beginning and the end of the funereal music. The fast movement represents resolution, resignation and regainedgaiety. This part, pulsating like a waltz and echoing the modulation technique of Richard Strauss, is followed by the solemn return of the opening chords.

The Cossacks played an integral part in Russia's history which finally ended with the Soviet occupation in the 1920s. Franco Cesarini had the opportunity to attend performances by an ethnic group of Cossacks from Kuban. He was deeply touched by the beauty of the songs and traditional dances of the Cossacks and has written **Cossack Dance** to faithfully retain the essential spirit of this seductive music.

TrompetenmuckI is a traditional polka, most notably recorded by German big band leader and composer James Last (1929-2015). Trumpet soloists Levente and Péter Csikota will be joined by UNI Wind Ensemble trumpet section leader Kate McAlister for this arrangement for trumpet trio and band.
