Director



Diana Blake graduated Osceola High School (Clarke Community) in 1959. She received a Bachelor and Master of Music in Education degrees from Drake University. She has also completed graduate work at The University of Michigan and The University of Northern Iowa.

While completing her master's degree, Blake taught lessons for the Des Moines Public Schools. Her first contract job began in August 1965, at Waverly-Shell Rock Community Schools, teaching 6th and 7th grade band. Over the course of 38 years, she taught band 5 through 8, junior high jazz band, lessons for grades 5 - 12, (even taught a few bassoon lessons at Wartburg College), 9th and 10th grade band, and flags for the high school marching band. Blake's longest assignment was 5th grade (beginners) and 8th grade band. Over the course of Blake's teaching years, she has also directed several honor bands.

A notable member of the Iowa Band community, Blake has been recognized several times for her outstanding leadership and musicianship. Some of those honors

include the Philip Sehmann Excellence In Teaching Award - Elementary Level, the Karl King Distinguished Service Award for active directors in 1994 and 2000, and the Karl King Distinguished Service Award for retired directors in 2007 and 2020, and the W-SR Friend of Education for working with high school and junior high students at festival and contest time. Each year the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier recognizes "eight remarkable individuals who are 80 or older and who in their own way have spent their lives demonstrating leadership." Blake was honored as one of the "8 over 80" this past summer for her years of dedication to education and community.

Diana Blake has directed the UNI New Horizons Band since May 2004. As a performer, Blake has played clarinet in the Waterloo Municipal Band since 1983 and bassoon in the Cedar Falls Municipal Band since 1988. She can also be found teaching private oboe and bassoon lessons in her studio and enjoys preparing students for All-State auditions and solo festivals.

Featured Artists



Heather Hamilton is an arts administrator, educator and performer that cares deeply about teaching students how to express themselves and live creatively through learning music. She is currently the Director of the University of Northern lowa Community Music School and teaches music education and music theory courses in the School of Music at the University of Northern lowa.

As a clarinetist, Heather has had the pleasure of performing with the Central Wisconsin Symphony Orchestra, the Quad City Opera Company, and the Quad City Symphony, in addition to the Central Kentucky Concert Band, which is recognized as the premier adult concert band in the Commonwealth. Heather also enjoys performing with the "New Horizons Clarinets and Friends" ensemble at area assisted living centers throughout the year. A highlight of her summers is performing in the beautiful Overman Park with the Cedar Falls Municipal Band, and along the Cedar River with the Waterloo Municipal band.

Originally from Moline, IL, Heather grew up with musician and music educator parents, which instilled from a young age a passion for music and education. Heather completed her undergraduate degree at Western Illinois University in Music Performance, going on to complete a Master of Music Education with an emphasis in Clarinet Pedagogy from the University of Wisconsin – Stevens Point. Her masters research and capstone project focused on how to utilize the National Standards of Music and Comprehensive Musicianship in beginning clarinet instruction.

Heather has taught clarinet for several years, in Illinois, Wisconsin, Kentucky, and Iowa, in addition to holding positions as an instructor at Black Hawk College and in the Arts and Culture Outreach program at UW-Stevens Point. Heather has also worked in music retail, and managed various music lesson studios throughout her career. Her proudest achievements, however, come from seeing students succeed, not only as musicians, but to see them grow up to be some pretty special people.

Heather's primary clarinet instructors include Andrea Splittberger-Rosen, Molly Paccione, Eric Ginsberg, and Himie Voxman. As a firm believer in the importance of being a life-long-learner, Heather enjoys expanding her artistry and professional skills as a founding member of Music360's Thrive Membership. Her music education and career mentors include lxi Chen and Dr. Tiffany Valvo. When not playing, teaching or administering, she enjoys playing with her Pomapoo "Gracie," sampling *all* the coffee, and connecting with friends and family.



Hailed by the New York Times as possessing "rich tone and deft technique," Hannah Porter Occeña is Assistant Professor of Flute at the University of Northern Iowa and Principal Flutist of the Topeka Symphony Orchestra (Topeka, KS). Previous positions include Principal Flute of the Midwest Chamber Ensemble (Prairie Village, KS) and Associate Principal Flute of the Bismarck-Mandan Symphony Orchestra (Bismarck, ND). The 2012 Irene Burchard prizewinner at the Royal Academy of Music, Dr. Occeña has performed as an orchestral soloist, recitalist, and clinician throughout the US and abroad.

Committed to the rich heritage and new horizons of the repertoire, Dr. Occeña strives to make classical works accessible and engaging to diverse audiences. Between her performance schedule and collegiate teaching responsibilities, Dr. Occeña participates in outreach concerts and programs at schools and community centers. Some of her most meaningful musical experiences have taken place

during performances at special needs schools and concerts in association with Autism Speaks.

A dedicated scholar, Dr. Occeña has recently presented at the National Flute Association conventions in Orlando and Salt Lake City as well as the Rochester Flute Fair. She has collaborated on new editions of the Sonata in B minor by Amanda Maier and the Sonata op. 94 by Sergei Prokofiev and serves on the National Flute Association Special Publications Committee.

Dr. Occeña is a 2018 DMA graduate of Stony Brook University, where she studied with Carol Wincenc; she holds a Master of Music Dip.RAM from the Royal Academy of Music and a Bachelor of Music from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance. When not performing, Dr. Occeña enjoys spending time outdoors with her family. She can be heard on New Beginnings: American and Australian Duos for Flute and Piano with the Occeña-Chen Duo, and Voices from the Middle and Spohr, Forevermore! with the Midwest Chamber Ensemble. She is a Miyazawa Artist and plays on a Miyazawa Elite.
