

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Dr. Cayla Bellamy currently serves as Assistant Professor of Bassoon at the University of Northern Iowa, where she teaches courses in applied bassoon, chamber music, woodwind literature, and music education techniques. She is also a core bassoonist and contrabassoonist with wcfsymphony and a member of the Kairos Trio, an Iowa-based trio d'anches with colleagues Drs. Amanda McCandless and Heather Peyton. With this ensemble, Cayla has been invited to perform at both regional and national conferences for the National Association of Wind and Percussion Instructors, in addition to the international premieres of three American duos for bassoon and alto saxophone at

the 2017 College Music Society International Conference in Sydney, Australia with Dr. Ann Bradfield.

Cayla released her debut album, "Double or Nothing," in September 2018 in collaboration with Navy Field Band bassoonist J. Benjamin Smith, highlighting contemporary works by living composers for solo and duo bassoon. Her premiere recording of Alex Shapiro's "Deep" was selected for inclusion in the Mark Masters label 2018 compilation album *Mark Moods, Vol. 1*, and she will also soon be heard on William Ludwig's solo and chamber music album *A Bassoonists' World*.

Cayla holds a Doctor of Music degree in Bassoon Performance and Literature from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University in addition to Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in Music Education and Bassoon Performance from the University of Georgia, where she was distinguished as a National Presser Scholar. Cayla performs on a Fox 201 paired with a Wolf-Grundmann bocal, and you can find out more about her online at www.caylabellamy.com.

Ryan Frost serves as Instructor of Percussion at the University of Northern Iowa where he teaches applied percussion lessons, percussion methods, and directs the UNI Percussion/Marimba, West African (UNI-WADE), and Taiko Drum Ensembles. He previously held teaching positions at Fairmont State University, Waynesburg University, Washington and Jefferson College, and Middle Tennessee State University. Frost was pleased to receive the Outstanding Adjunct Award for Teaching Excellence at Fairmont State University.

As an active educator and performer, Frost has experience in western and non-western music, presenting clinics and hands-on workshops across the country for groups of all ages and levels of experience. Well versed in concert percussion, Frost also has extensive experience in music of non-western cultures. He was the recipient of the Global Education Opportunities grant which enabled him to study Ghanaian drumming and dance at the Dagbe Cultural Institute and Arts Center and the Dagara Music Center in Ghana.

Frost's research, "Halim El-Dabh's Use of Images to Depict Sound in *Sonic No.* 7 and *Sonic No.* 10," was featured at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention and won first place in the West Virginia University Creative Arts, Faculty-Student Mentored Graduate Research Awards.

Frost received a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from West Virginia University, a Master of Arts degree from Middle Tennessee State University, and a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Northern Iowa. Ryan proudly endorses Innovative Percussion sticks and mallets.
