As many students were packing up their dorm rooms and heading into summer vacation, students in the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra, Varsity Glee Club and Cecilians were packing their bags for their summer tours to Italy!

Under the direction of faculty artist and conductor John Wiles, members of the Cecilians and Varsity Glee Club traveled to Italy May 13-22. The choirs first visited the Tuscany region, where they toured the cities of Lucca, Florence and Siena, and offered performances at St. Bartolomeo Abbey, and in collaboration with Corale Valdera. Following their time in Tuscany, the choirs headed to Rome where they toured the Spanish Steps, Trevi Fountain, Piazza Navone, Vatican Museums, the Sistine Chapel and more. The groups offered several concerts in Rome including performances at the Basilica di Santa Croce in Gerusalemme with Coro Musicanova, and St. Peter's Basilica. On their final day of the tour, the choirs took a trip through Ancient Rome where they saw the Roman Forum, and the famous Colosseum. After a final

performance and farewell dinner, the singers headed back home to lowa, with one Glee Club member noting, "This trip has meant so much to all of us and provided us with countless experiences and memories that we will never forget."

Just before the choirs headed home, our Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of faculty artist and conductor Erik Rohde, departed for their own journey to Italy, May 19-29. The orchestra spent time in northern Italy, stopping in Venice, Padua, Cremona and Alba. The group offered a performance at Teatro Aurora in Padua, an exchange concert with Cremona Mousikè at Cortile Palazzo Fodri in Cremona, and two performances featured at the Alba International Music Festival. Sight-seeing on this adventure was truly special, including stops at St. Mark's Square, Doge's Palace, St. Mark's Basilica, the Verona Arena, Igor Stravinsky's gravesite, and Museo del Violino (Violin Museum), known for its collection of stringed instruments including those crafted by Antonio Stradivari himself.

Reflecting on the trip, Rohde shared, "The orchestra tour to northern Italy this May was an amazing experience, full of great performances and cultural immersion in both small and large cities. Highlights include a sideby-side concert in Cremona with a local youth orchestra, performing Aaron Jay Kernis' Musica Celestis with the composer present in Alba, and performing the European premiere of Jennifer Higdon's flute concerto The Light That We Can Hear with Dr. Occeña. We saw quite a few historic instruments, and our bass section got to play several instruments in a museum

in Venice, including an Amati bass! We had many surprises, including an impromptu Educational Concert in Busca and lots of audience demands for encores at our last two performances the audience asked for three encores at each performance! It was an unforgettable experience and so fun to spend extended time together as a group and experience the culture, food and music of Italy. Audiences were appreciative and also impressed with the level of playing of the group. Bravi to all of the students who performed!" 🞜

UNI and Kirkwood Community College come together to offer 2+2 Music Degree

In a groundbreaking move within the realm of music education, the University of Northern Iowa School of Music and Kirkwood Community College have proudly entered into a unique partnership allowing students to complete a Bachelor of Arts in Music. A 2+2 articulation agreement opens doors for students to seamlessly transition from an Associate of Applied Arts in Music at Kirkwood to a comprehensive Bachelor of Arts in Music at UNI, fostering a well-rounded and enriched musical education.

"This pathway allows students to achieve their goal through two years at Kirkwood followed by two years at UNI," said Melinda Boyd, Director of the School of Music at UNI. "The 2+2 articulation agreement stands as a testament to the forward-thinking approach of both institutions and their dedication to enhancing educational opportunities in the field of music."

"This exciting new partnership increases the opportunities for our music students to transfer," said Kirkwood Dean of Arts and Humanities Jennifer Cunningham. "Kirkwood students will now have the opportunity to start their music career path at Kirkwood and easily transfer to UNI which is well known for producing quality musicians and educators. This articulation will save students thousands of dollars on their postsecondary education and they will know that they are transferring to a school that has a very high rate of career placement after graduation."

While administrators at both institutions have been interested in a partnership for years, the articulation agreement is now made possible through UNIFI leveraging UNI's general education requirements, which are designed to offer students increased flexibility in tailoring their academic journey to align with their individual goals.

The partnership emphasizes the importance of collaborative initiatives in higher education. Faculty and staff at both institutions are dedicated to finding additional transfer pathways for the benefit of our mutual students.

The 2+2 music degree program reflects a commitment to student success, providing a navigable path for aspiring musicians to cultivate their talents and achieve their academic and professional aspirations.

A featured stop on their fall tour, the ensemble performed patriotic favorites alongside classic and contemporary repertoire, including works by Sousa, Bach, Verdi, music from the film Catch Me if You Can, and a medley of the hits of Frank Sinatra.



The UNI Connection: **Rider Returns**

As a professional musician who got her start at UNI's School of Music, Master Gunnery Sqt. Susan Rider uses her musical talents to hail the red, white and blue every day — but she still has a special affinity for the purple and gold. She has played in the White House numerous times and been featured in six Presidential Inaugurations, all as part of the mission of The President's Own United States Marine Band, which she's been a part of since 1997.

"Keith Johnson, one of my professors at UNI, used to say to me, 'My trumpet has taken me places I never thought I would go,' and now I say the same thing," said Rider, who graduated with a degree in music in 1989. "Through my ability to play a trumpet, I've had the opportunity to be a part of a lot of really, really excellent, fun and meaningful events."

For Rider, some highlights of her work have included playing for 1.8 million people when President Barack Obama was inaugurated and performing with composer John Williams at the Kennedy Center for the band's 225th anniversary.

Tying it all Together: Galyen **Inducted into American Bandmasters Association**

Following their performance in Cedar Falls, and their remaining tour dates, The President's Own United States Marine Band returned to Washington, DC. In March, UNI School of Music faculty artist Danny Galyen also traveled to Washington, DC, to conduct this world-renowned ensemble, as part of the celebration for his induction into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (ABA) (as reported in detail in our fall 2023 issue). In February, GRAMMY® award-wining woodwind quintet Imani Winds visited UNI for a performance at the Gallagher Bluedorn. During their residency, members of the ensemble led hands-on workshops for School of Music students.



In the spring of 2024, UNI Opera presented Suor Angelica from Puccini's *Il trittico* in the Gallagher Bluedorn on the UNI campus. Performances were held March 1-3. The production featured a double cast with the UNI Opera Ensemble, faculty artist Suzanne Hendrix-Case and guest artist Karen Vuong, under the direction of Richard Gammon, with vocal coaches Korey Barrett and Kate Saulsbury. The performance also featured the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra led by Erik Rohde.

Suor Angelica composed by Giacomo Puccini, with libretto written by Giovacchino Forzano, comes from a set of three one-act operas, II trittico. The theme of II trittico exposes humanity in the context of death. The opera is set in a convent where the title character, Suor Angelica (Sister Angelica), has been cut off from her

royal ties after having a child out of wedlock. Cast out by her family and sent to atone for her sins, Suor Angelica has already spent seven years in the convent when the opera begins. When one of her royal relatives, La Zia Principessa, comes to visit, Suor Angelica's entire world changes.

This production featured a modern design with visual significance parallel to that of the nun's lifestyle. The set also included stage with reflective black marley. This element lengthened the verticality of the visuals on stage deepening the audience's visual of gesture phrases performed by the community of nuns in addition to the colorful flowers on stage. With help from Aharon Moody and William (Chris) Tuzicka, truss frames became a movable cross suspended above the stage that moved in connection with the narrative aspect of the opera.

An integral moment in the opera when Suor Angelica receives news of her son from her estranged relative, La Zia Principessa, the cross turns away from her as she enters the stage. At the climactic ending of the opera, a heavenly presence was felt by the falling petals alongside the nuns' gestural representations of prayer, as Suor Angelica took her last moments on the stage.

Joley Seitz, second-year vocal performance graduate student and graduate assistant, performed the title role of Suor Angelica, in addition to her other double cast member, Karen Vuong.

"Suor Angelica was a beautiful experience to be a part of and such a powerful story to tell. What I loved most about portraying Angelica was getting a chance to show the audience

the power of a mother's love. Puccini showcased the pain and anguish of Angelica's struggle of morality through his music," Seitz said.

"During my time at UNI, I was lucky enough to work on this role with a wonderful voice professor, Jean McDonald, vocal coaches Korey Barrett and Kate Saulsbury, and opera director, Richard Gammon. I will forever be grateful for the education and performance opportunities that UNI has given me over the past six years." Gammon noted how the varying levels of experience from secondyear undergraduates (some nonmajors) to graduate students, and world-class faculty and guest artists, created an environment where all members could be a part of community while witnessing various levels of collaboration. UNI opera students were able to witness the professionals' processes and approaches, while also exploring ways to define and diversify their own artistry through different character depictions across the double cast members.

"Because it was a double cast, I think that it was also good for the students because they could see how you could have two different interpretations of a character, and both are OK. That you can make different decisions and there isn't a right or wrong, that there are several solutions that work," Hendrix-Case, faculty artist, said. In addition, she noted how the students benefited from seeing "how the professionals work and what the expectations are for a professional performance."

The power of Suor Angelica resonated across these many perspectives, while the production structure welcomed various levels of experience that resulted in performances that shaped impactful experiences for both performers and audience members. 🞜

It Was a **Very Good Year**

Jazz Division Updates

The 2023-24 school year was an extremely productive one for student composers and arrangers in the Jazz Division. Bookending the year's performance calendar were two student recitals featuring major writing projects for small group. In October, senior trombonist Levi Temple presented the entirety of his debut album, What Once Was, which captures musically the arc of a relationship. April was senior saxophonist Logan Neifert's turn, with the premiere of his extended piece, Music of the Spheres, inspired by radio wave emissions from various bodies in our solar system.

Along with small group writing, each of the three big bands performed student scores this year. Four of Jazz Band One's five on-campus concerts featured at least one student score, including originals and arrangements by Temple, sophomore trumpeter Sean Kiefer, and graduate saxophonist Simon White. Together, the trio contributed 10 new scores to the Jazz Band One library, and two of Kiefer's big band originals were selected for events sponsored by the International Society of Jazz Arrangers and Composers (ISJAC), an online workshop with composer/arranger John Beasley called *Uncharted Territory*, and the New Music Workshop at the ISJAC conference in Nashville. Additionally, Jazz Band Two premiered an original composition by first-year student pianist Lucas Zaehringer, and Jazz Band Three programmed an original

by first-year trombonist Brody Schoon, and an arrangement by ensemble director White.

In April, Jazz Band One hosted Dave Rivello (Director of the New Jazz Ensemble, Eastman School of Music), who provided feedback for the 14 students in Arranging II in the form of a seminar in which Jazz Band One played student works for his comments. He also conducted the band on four of his original compositions in concert. In addition to the Rivello residency, the Jazz Division hosted several other quest artists and clinicians.

In October, we welcomed home UNI alum and vocalist Dakota Andersen, who performed with both Jazz Band One and Jazz Band Two. Included in the program was Andersen's original song, "Turn that Frown Upside Down," arranged by alumnus James Mons. In February, jazz guitar legend Mike Stern (Blood, Sweat and Tears, Miles Davis) visited for the Tallcorn Jazz Festival and Sinfonian Dimensions in Jazz concerts. He was joined by his wife, Leni Stern, a remarkable quitarist in her own right. In addition to the concerts and Tallcorn clinics, the two gave private instruction to student and faculty quitarists. In March, pianist and composer Geoffrey Keezer gave a presentation to the Arranging II class, and performed a stunning duo concert with vocalist Gillian Margot. Concurrent with the spring Jazz Band One concert in April, alumni

Nic Addelia and Erin Maltby-Addelia organized an alumni event, drawing dozens of jazz division alumni back to campus. Among them was trumpeter Chris Van Leeuwen, who gave excellent trumpet masterclasses for both the trumpet studio and the jazz students.

The Jazz faculty also had an eventful year. Michael Conrad was awarded the prestigious Sammy Nestico Prize for 2023, which carries with it a commission for the United States Air Force Band to write an original work for The Airmen of Note. The Iowa Jazz Composers Orchestra, under Conrad's direction (and featuring faculty artists Christopher Merz and Anthony Williams), performed at Hoyt Sherman Place (Des Moines), KCCK Radio's Jazz Under the Stars (Cedar Rapids), the Redstone Room (Davenport), and the Coralville Center for the Performing Arts. In addition, Conrad received a Jazz Road Tours Grant in support of a tour through Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Iowa for the Mike Conrad Trio. Merz's septet, Shorter Stories (featuring School of Music faculty members Williams, Conrad, and Alexander Pershounin along with recently retired guitar instructor Bob Dunn, local drummer Josh Hakanson, and trumpeter Jon Ailabouni from UW LaCrosse), released their debut album, New Juju, on SkyDeck Records. The band performed on the main stage at the Iowa City Jazz Festival, Noce Jazz Club (Des Moines), and Opus Concert Café (Cedar Rapids). Merz was also invited to conduct the Massachusetts All-State Jazz Band for the second time in March, and his arrangement of Wayne Shorter's "Speak No Evil" was selected for the ISJAC New Music Workshop. 5

Community Outreach

Our community outreach programs continued to explore new and innovative ways of bringing music to their students this year.





Community Music School

Another year has come and gone, and the Community Music School (CMS) is honored to have been a part of so many lives while enriching the community through music. Our year began with celebrating the School of Music theme of "All of Us," embracing a commitment to better our community by providing opportunities for young and old to experience music, whether it be by creating their own, or providing engaging concert opportunities.

We celebrated our mission by providing musical opportunities for persons from at least 24 lowa cities, and by inviting guest artists from the community to participate in concerts. The New Horizons Band welcomed alphorn soloists David and Lisa Lang to perform with the band at their fall concert, followed in the spring by inviting the newly established Mariachi Panteras, led by School of Music Director, Melinda Boyd, to perform mariachi music for concert goers prior to the New Horizons Band spring concert. The Children's Choir was honored to be invited to perform at the annual UNI Varsity Glee Club Christmas Variety Show. Children's Choir members performed two songs, directed by Ryan Occeña, including one piece with Glee Club members. Other Children's Choir concerts included members of the Metropolitan Chorale, and gospel soloist Kenesha Davis.

In addition to the usual CMS ensembles and learning opportunities, a new Community Horn Choir was established this winter. Led by faculty artist Maddy Tarantelli, the horn choir welcomed over a dozen hornists of varying experiences from the Cedar Valley and surrounding communities, including UNI horn students. Meeting monthly, the horn choir made its first performance at the UNI Horn Studio concert this past spring.

On April 14, the UNI Spectrum Project resumed its activities for a second year following a hiatus due to COVID, presenting their show and art exhibit titled Once Upon an Adventure. The production featured a cast of 38 performers ranging from ages five to nineteen, supported by 41 volunteers from UNI and Hawkeye Community College, and faculty from the School of Music. They showcased a blend of music, dance and drama scenes to an audience exceeding 1000. Every Saturday since January, the Spectrum Project rehearsed to develop and practice for the show. Before the show, attendees enjoyed an immersive art display in the Gallagher Bluedorn lobby, exploring multiple biomes filled with jellyfish, snakes and aliens.

On May 18, the School of Music hosted the 3rd Annual Spectrum JamFest, a fundraising concert benefiting the UNI Spectrum Project. More than 40 modern school bands, totaling 177 students, took the stage to perform the latest hits and their original compositions. Returning for a second year, Mandy Harvey served as the guest artist. Known for her inspiring performances on America's Got Talent, Harvey, a singer-songwriter, lost her hearing at a young age yet perseveres in writing and performing her music.



Suzuki School

The UNI Suzuki School has been busy this year providing individual and group lessons, hosting student and faculty recitals, facilitating orchestra concerts and tours, and presenting the final concert of the year for all students in May.

The Suzuki School has a unique opportunity to offer many years of music experiences and opportunities to our students creating long time associations and friendships. Pictured above are this year's graduating seniors. Some have been with the program for 15 years. The Suzuki method offers a mother tongue approach giving students the opportunity to play their instrument before they learn to read music in a similar way that they learn to speak before they learn to read. With the help of their parents attending lessons alongside them and their patient teachers, students gain instrument skills and eventually learn to read music, participate in ensembles, join their school music programs, and reap the many benefits of studying music.

Some Suzuki graduates may include music studies in their post-high school experiences while others do not. Some will choose non-musical careers, with participating in music an option during college or later, while some will add music as a minor or second major. Regardless, all find their time with the Suzuki School rewarding for however many years they participate. 🞜

The UNI School of Music proudly recognizes last year's competition winners and acknowledges the many honors and awards that our students have earned.

In fall 2023, the School of Music hosted the Instrumental Concerto Competition contest. Eight finalists competed in a live performance held at the Gallagher Bluedorn on Nov. 1. Turner Sperry was selected as the winner of the competition, with Aubrey Williamson and Aiden Endres receiving honorable mentions.

Turner Sperry is a senior at UNI studying cello performance under Isidora Nojkovic. During summers, Turner has had the opportunity of studying with cellists like Andrew Mark, Rhonda Rider, Thomas Mesa, Hannah Holman, and many more while attending music festivals like Green Mountain Chamber Music Festival, Eastern Music Festival, and the Emerald Chamber Music Festival. A founding member of the

Petrichord Quartet. Turner is the event coordinator, treasurer and music librarian for the group. The quartet has performed around the Midwest, most notably being featured in the Gallagher Bluedorn's Candlelight Concert Series in Oct. 2023. The group regularly collaborates with students and composers at UNI, and performed with the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra this summer on their Italy tour. Turner's solo endeavors include actively subbing with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra, Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony, and the Fort Dodge Area Symphony Orchestra. This fall, Turner plans on attending graduate school for a master's degree in cello performance.

Emma Hawkinson was named the 2024 Presser Scholar Award winner in January. The Presser Foundation supports undergraduate students across the country committed to advancing music through their studies. The prestigious Presser Scholar Award is granted to an outstanding music major in their junior year. Selected by the music faculty, the Award recipient

shows a high level of academic and musical accomplishment and embodies the qualities of leadership and citizenship. The Presser Scholar is one who has grown individually and who has contributed earnestly to the success of the School of Music. The Award is an honor and the recipient will be known as a Presser Scholar during their senior year. Emma is majoring in vocal performance, and is active in the string department as a violinist. She is currently involved in three ensembles: UNI Opera, the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra (NISO), and Concert Chorale. She is on the executive boards of both Students of Singing and the NISO Student Leadership Committee. She is also a Peer Educator for the School of Music, a church choir section leader, and has taught violin and music privately for over four years.

In March, the Emerging Artist Competition was held live in the Gallagher Bluedorn.







Aiden Endres, marimba, was awarded the top honor of the Charles and Marleta Matheson Award. Endres is a third-year Percussion Performance Major from Minnesota. He is a versatile performer across campus and leads his jazz fusion band in the Midwest. Aiden recently secured a position as Section Percussionist/Assistant Timpanist with a symphony in Illinois. Passionate about his craft, he seeks mentorship from professionals such as Erich Rieppel and intends to continue percussion performance in graduate school.

Lauren Geerlings, violin, won the Curtiss-Fullerton Award and the People's Choice Award. Geerlings is a junior at UNI studying violin and oboe performance under the direction of Nash Ryder and Heather Peyton. She is currently involved in numerous ensembles and student organizations including the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra (NISO), Wind Ensemble, Petrichord String Quartet, Sigma Alpha Iota, UNI School of Music student support team, NISO student leadership committee, and School of Music Student Advisory Board. FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

Amanda **McCandless**

Amanda McCandless, Professor of Clarinet, joined the faculty at UNI in 2008 and since that time has built one of the largest and most successful clarinet studios in the region. During the 2023-24 academic year, she also served as Interim Associate Dean of the College of Humanities, Arts and Sciences.

McCandless has performed recitals throughout the U.S. and abroad, recently performing in Dublin, Ireland at the International Clarinet Association's 2024 ClarinetFest. She has appeared as a guest soloist with the Caxias do Sul (Brazil) Symphony Orchestra and appeared as guest soloist with the UNI Wind Symphony on their tour of northern Italy. She has also been a guest artist and clinician at the China Conservatory (Beijing, China), Sichuan Conservatory (China), Universidade de Caxias do Sul (Brazil), Universidade do Rio Grande do Sul (Brazil), Universidade de Brasília (Brazil), the Universidade Federal de Goiás (Brazil), the Bolivian National Conservatory of Music in La Paz, Bolivia, and at the University of Puerto Rico Mayaguez. She has been a quest artist at many international, national and regional clarinet events, including the International Clarinet Association's ClarinetFest, Flute New Music Consortium Festival. NACWPI National Convention, College Music Society's regional and national conventions, the University of Oklahoma Clarinet Symposium,

Michigan State University's Clarinet Spectacular, and the Eastern Kentucky University Clarinet Festival. She is also a sought-after guest recitalist and clinician at many universities in the U.S. McCandless is also Second Clarinetist in the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony Orchestra. She previously held the position of Principal Clarinet of the Tulsa Symphony and Ballet Orchestras and has performed as a substitute clarinetist in orchestras throughout the Midwest.

McCandless is a noted advocate and performer of clarinet works by women composers. She has released two albums of unaccompanied clarinet works by women composers on the Mark Records Label, with a third volume premiering this year. She has commissioned works by composers Theresa Martin, Rebecca Burkhardt, and Daijana Wallace, and regularly presents concerts highlighting the work of underrepresented composers. In 2022, McCandless received a grant from the Iowa Arts Council to present presentations about works by women and underrepresented composers

to primary and secondary school students, with the goal of inspiring students of every identity to pursue artistic participation and engagement. Established in 2015, McCandless hosts UNI Clarinet Choir Day every November as a fun, educational opportunity for clarinetists of all ages to come together and enjoy making music. Typically hosting 75 to 100 clarinetists per year, the event attracts clarinetists from the ages of 10 to 75 years old. She also frequently travels across lowa to give masterclasses for middle and high school students, hoping that music can become a lifelong endeavor regardless of one's career, identity or circumstances. McCandless holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree and Master of Music degree from Michigan State University, where she was a student of Elsa Ludewig-Verdehr. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Eastern Kentucky University, where she was a student of Connie Rhoades. 🞜

New Hires and Retirements in the School of Music

This year the School of Music celebrated the influential careers of four exceptional faculty members as they retired in 2023-24: Jean McDonald, Michelle Swanson, Diane Vallentine and John Vallentine all celebrated retirement this year.



Jean McDonald celebrated her retirement at the conclusion of the fall 2023 semester, having served as professor of voice at UNI since 1988. Jean has been an active contributor to creative life at UNI, appearing as a featured soloist in Faculty Showcase and Spotlight Series events, performing a broad variety of literature with an emphasis on chamber works, including several premieres. Recent performances have included, Ravel's Sheherazade with the Northern Iowa Symphony Orchestra, Britten's Abraham and Isaac for the Cedar Valley Chamber Music Festival, and Il Tramonto by Resphigi with the UNI Faculty String Quartet.

In March 2001, McDonald performed the West Coast premiere of Jeremy Beck's *Black Water*, a mono-drama based on the novel by Joyce Carol Oates, at California State University at Fullerton, a work she has recorded in collaboration with UNI faculty

pianist, Robin Guy, released by Innova Records. The CD, pause and feel and hark, has since been recognized by Gramophone Magazine as one of the "best new recordings from North America." In 2006, McDonald, for whom numerous works have been composed, showcased the work of faculty colleague and composer Jonathan Schwabe in a premiere of "Anyone Lived in a Pretty How Town" for mezzo-soprano and orchestra.

McDonald has appeared as a soloist throughout the region and with several new music organizations throughout the country. She was a guest with the 2008 Mendocino Music Festival in performances of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9. A familiar face to Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony Orchestra patrons, she also has appeared with Des Moines Symphony, Cedar Rapids Symphony, Quad-Cities Mozart Festival and the Messiah Festival of Music and Art (Lindsborg, KS), in performances of opera, oratorio and song. She holds degrees from the University of Iowa and Simpson College along with several competitive honors, including awards from the National Association of Teachers of Singing Artist Auditions, and the District Metropolitan Opera Auditions. McDonald's students have earned numerous honors and awards and have secured placement in programs and positions of significant repute throughout the country





Michelle Swanson celebrated her retirement from UNI at the end of spring 2024, having served as Assistant Professor of Music Education, completing her 26th year of teaching at UNI and her 33rd year of teaching overall. At UNI, Swanson taught Elementary General Music Methods, Piano Beyond Proficiency for the Choral Classroom, Choral Methods and Materials. Choral Methods for Instrumental Majors, Introduction to Music Education, Level III Field Experience, Soundscapes, and also supervised student teachers in elementary general music and secondary choral music placements. She was also an academic advisor for the upperclassmen choral, wind, brass, percussion and string music education students. In addition, Swanson hosted Music Education Workshops at UNI four times during each academic school year. Throughout the last 25 years, over 2,000 music educators and music education students attended the on-campus events.

While at UNI, Swanson conducted the UNI Children's Choir from 2003 to 2020. She also served on numerous committees and as the faculty sponsor for many student organizations including the Peer Educators, Sigma Alpha lota and SALT student ministry. Beyond campus, Swanson served as mentor chairperson for Iowa Alliance for Arts Education, was on the board of the Iowa Music Educators Association (the state chapter of NAfME), and is president-elect for the Northeast Iowa Food Bank.

Swanson received her BME, MM, and EdD degrees from the University of Northern Iowa, and also studied Orff Schulwerk at the University of St. Thomas under Jane Frazee, Arvida Steen, Judy Bond, Jay Broeker and Steve Calentropio. While an undergraduate student at UNI, Swanson studied piano with Howard Aibel and voice with Leslie Morgan.

Prior to teaching at UNI, Swanson taught elementary general music in the Cedar Falls Community School district for seven years at Southdale, Valley Park, and North Cedar elementary schools. She now frequently accompanies the local schools and enjoys assisting music teachers in the local district. Before joining the faculty in the School of Music, Swanson was the elementary general music teacher at Malcolm Price Laboratory School on the UNI campus.

Swanson has conducted numerous elementary, middle and high school honor choirs throughout lowa and the Midwest over the years. She conducted the All-lowa Opus Honor Choir in 2013. Swanson founded and conducted the Sturgis Falls Children's Choir from 1993 to 2005, and was awarded a Gold Star Teaching Award in 1996. Reflecting on retirement, Swanson is most looking forward to spending time with her husband Chad, and their two adult children, Elizabeth and Matthew, and enjoying traveling, board games, outdoor activities, and time with extended family.





Diane Vallentine celebrated her retirement from UNI at the end of spring 2024. Diane served as an adjunct faculty member in the School of Music since 2001, teaching courses in music theory, liberal arts core and occasionally private saxophone. She holds a master's degree in theory with an emphasis in composition from the University of Kentucky and is a Summa Cum Laude graduate of Southeast Missouri State University where she earned undergraduate degrees in music theory/composition and music education. Diane's compositions have been performed throughout the Midwest and she has won several awards including First Place in the Music Teacher's National Association Composition Contest.

Previously, Vallentine taught elementary, junior high and high school bands in St. Louis, Missouri, and Valmeyer, Illinois. She has performed as a soloist on saxophone and flute, including a guest solo concerto performance at UNI. She has also performed as a solo concerto and faculty recitalist, and as a guest conductor at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville.



John Vallentine celebrated his retirement from UNI in early September 2024. In his most recent role, John reported to the Provost and Executive Vice President as the Associate Provost for Faculty at UNI. In that role, some of his responsibilities included advancing the university vision, mission and strategic plan in relation to faculty activities; providing faculty personnel support to Academic Affairs Division; providing oversight of the Center for Excellence in Teaching & Learning; elevating diversity in faculty hiring, retention, and review; and serving as Academic Affairs representative on the threat assessment team and other campus-wide committees.

Vallentine currently serves as a National Association of Schools of Music Visiting Evaluator for universities located throughout the United States. In 2018, he was selected as a member of the 2018 Seminar on Leadership of the Faculty at Harvard University.



As a professor of music, John formerly served as director of the UNI School of Music from 1998-2017. During his tenure as director, the School of Music celebrated numerous advancements: the school gained national and international recognition, growing to include 58 faculty members and more than 300 music majors; faculty members and student ensembles received prestigious invitations and performed around the world; the \$23 million dollar Gallagher Bluedorn Performing Arts Center opened and a major \$12 million-dollar renovation project was completed for the music building, Russell Hall; and the School of Music endowment in support of faculty and students grew to more than \$5 million dollars. From 1991 to 1998, he served as director of the UNI Panther Marching and Symphonic Bands, and taught applied clarinet lessons. He also taught undergraduate and graduate music education and conducting courses. Other positions previously held were at the University of Kentucky, University of Wisconsin-Platteville and in the Waterloo, Illinois public schools.

Vallentine, a clarinetist and pianist, has published research on applied music teaching behaviors; presented on technology and distance learning; served as an accompanist; and conducted bands, offered master classes, and performed throughout the Midwest and internationally in Costa Rica and Russia. His bands were selected to perform for NFL football games for the Green Bay Packers.

Professor Vallentine holds a
Ph.D. in Music Education from the
University of Kentucky; a Master of
Music Degree in Conducting from
the University of Northern lowa;
and a Bachelor of Music Education
Degree from Southeast Missouri
State University. John resides
in Cedar Falls with his wife Diane
(featured on the previous page),
and has four grown children and
two grandchildren.

We were sad to hear of the passing of our past graduates and friends.

The School of Music was deeply saddened by the loss of David Dunn. David passed away unexpectedly as the result of a heart attack on March 19, 2024. Born in Colorado Springs, Colorado, David earned a bachelor's degree from Augustana College, and a master's degree from Amherst College. David served the School of Music in the role of Piano Maintenance Technician and Coordinator from 2011-2024. He also served as adjunct instructor of string bass at UNI in 2006-07, and as a faculty member for the UNI Jazz Combo Camp from 2001 to 2007. David was an incredible colleague and dear friend to so many in the School of Music community, and he will be dearly missed.

The School of Music is also mourning the loss of Professor Emeritus Jon Hansen, who passed away on Sept. 21, 2023. Jon Hansen joined the faculty at UNI in 1969 teaching trombone, low brass, low brass techniques and brass literature. He received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from UNI (BA '61, MA '65). Hansen studied trombone privately with Frank Crisafulli, Chicago Symphony, Henry Smith, Minnesota Orchestra, Lewis Van Haney, Indiana University, and Arnold Jacobs of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He performed as a trombonist with the Northern Brass Quintet throughout his

tenure at UNI and with the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony Orchestra for over 30 years. Prior to joining the UNI music faculty, Jon taught instrumental music in several of lowa's schools and at Dickinson State College in North Dakota. Jon retired from UNI in 1993 and became active as a naturalist, ecologist and amateur geologist, all while continuing to be a huge supporter of the School of Music, alongside his wife of 63 years, Marilyn. Jon was inducted into the Curtiss-Fullerton Hall of Fame in the UNI School of Music in 2013. His impact was great, and his legacy will live on in the School of Music and far beyond.

Another huge loss to the School of Music community was the loss of Professor Emeritus A. John "Jack" Holstad, who passed away May 13, 2024. ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Joel Waggoner

Not many Iowa natives can say they've gotten the chance to share the big screen with multi-Academy Award-winning actress Meryl Streep — but UNI alum Joel Waggoner can. Waggoner recently appeared as the pianist in the Emmy-nominated Hulu show Only Murders in the Building alongside Streep and other A-list celebrities. "I got to conduct her for a day in the show, and that was surreal," said Waggoner. "She's a pro. All those people — Meryl Streep, Steve Martin, Martin Short — are lovely and hardworking and kind. I learned that you don't have to be those things, but it really helps. Seeing people who are at the top of their game being that gracious and patient and kind makes you want to be a better person. You could tell they felt lucky to be there."

The offer to play this role came at just the right time for Waggoner. He had been living in Iowa for a few years after moving back from New York when the pandemic hit and was about to give up on entertaining.

"I had depleted any opportunity ideas that I thought I'd had," he said. "The well had run dry. Then Only Murders in the Building happened, and it really changed the trajectory of my life and year. So, I realized how important it is to stay steady, and things will happen. You really do have to stick it out for a while."

Waggoner says the role was helpful for his career because it made him more recognizable to people in the industry and gave him an important TV credit on his resume that can help him get more high-caliber entertainment opportunities. It also allowed him to forge and solidify professional relationships.

Waggoner grew up in Waterloo. He learned how to play the piano at an early age, followed by the violin and the oboe. He was also heavily involved in community theater, which he credits for giving him confidence and a strong work ethic.

By the time Waggoner graduated high school, he was convinced he wanted to pursue musical theater. Initially, he did not want to go to UNI where his father Mike was a faculty member. He wanted a change.

At first, the plan was to stick it out at UNI for a semester. But one semester turned into 10.

"I went and made lifelong friends and then just didn't leave for five years!" he said.

Waggoner started out majoring in music education but quickly realized it wasn't a good fit. He switched to music performance for vocal music and violin.

"It's one of the best music schools in the country," said Waggoner of the UNI School of Music. "It was rigorous. It was difficult because I learned a lot. A lot was required of us. I felt really challenged, which was really important to me. I knew when I ended up going to UNI that I could always learn acting later. I knew for a fact that I wanted to be a really good musician, and I knew UNI could make me that."

While at UNI, Waggoner continued to be very engaged with theater. Looking back, he knows how special his level of involvement is.

"There were just so many different opportunities for me to go do whatever I wanted to," he said. "I loved that. I felt valued. And I just really loved the actual value. I think I just liked being able to have access to all that stuff that you wouldn't in a bigger school potentially."

Waggoner recalls being in a chorus line in Sweeney Todd, music directing a Best of Broadway review and performing in a Best of Broadway review. When he later taught undergraduate students in New York, he realized that many of his students would be lucky if they played an ensemble role on a mainstage show once during their four-year program. It made him appreciate UNI's smaller size allowing him so many cool opportunities.

After graduating from UNI in 2008, Waggoner moved out to New York to get his master's degree. He ended up living there for more than a decade. During that time, he wrote songs, taught voice lessons, played piano for auditions and music directed. He even performed in two Broadway shows, School of Rock and Be Chill.

Even with these accomplishments, Waggoner is no stranger to imposter syndrome. He's had to learn to believe others when they tell him he's done well.

A major turning point in his mindset came very recently when he performed at the Gallagher Bluedorn, alongside the Waterloo-Cedar Falls Symphony, for a musical New Year's Eve party. Although Waggoner had performed at the Gallagher both as a student and an alum, it was his first time performing as himself.

"I did that in front of my hometown," he said. "Every teacher I've ever had was there. I was very myself, warts and all. Was it perfect? No. But was it me? Yes."

As far as future projects are concerned, Waggoner believes that slump he was experiencing right before Only Murders in the Building is over, as he has plentiful ideas. He wants to write and perform a one-man show, write a musical that goes to Broadway, record numerous albums and finish developing a book and TV series for children.

We're proud to congratulate Joel on his extraordinary accomplishments and look forward to cheering him on in his future endeavors! 🞜


